

Prayer – A Communication Lifeline

The role and scope and importance of prayer in the life of a believer is nothing less than a profound mystery. Prayer is a lifeline of communication with our heavenly Father. Like communication is in a marriage, or any meaningful relationship, so is prayer in our relationship with the Lord. If we are not communicating, then how can that relationship continue to grow and deepen?

There are so many different levels of communication in prayer, depending on where we are at in our relationship with the Lord. Prayer is both simple, and yet infinite. Prayer can be as simple as the cry of a child, or an expression of the childish faith of a little child, or it can be the anxious cry of a mother's heart for her child, or it can be the cry of intercession for the lost, or prayer can be as infinite as the profound meditations of our hearts as we pursue a deeper relationship with the Lord, and a deeper understanding of the mysteries of the Trinity. The Lord meets each cry, and every seeker, right at the level where we are in our relationship with Him.

Perhaps the most basic and fundamental understanding of prayer is that it is a declaration of dependence and surrender to the Lord. To be prayerless is a declaration of independence – "I'm okay on my own; I don't need you, Lord." But the very nature of prayer is to declare, "I'm not okay on my own. I need you, Lord. I can't do this on my own. Will you please step in and take over, and help me do what I can't do."

But the mystery of prayer deepens, because it isn't enough to simply say a prayer like you were expressing a wish, and carry on with your life as usual. To express a sincere prayer to the Lord that reflects genuine communication with Him means that your life must be aligned with your prayer. That means that we must be continually examining our lives, and seeking to bring our lives in line with what we know and understand to be His will and nature. We need to confess our sins and failures. We need to humble ourselves before Him. We need to ask for His presence

and character to fill our lives, and be reflected in us. We need to seek His holiness and purity. We need to ask for the things that He desires for our lives. In this way a simple prayer leads us ever deeper into a meaningful relationship with the Lord, and shapes and influences our lives. True communication with the Lord in prayer is never something that is shallow or disconnected from the real issues of our lives.

Finally, a meaningful prayer life can take many different forms in the course of a day. I believe that a fixed daily time and place where you can meet with the Lord, and meditate on a passage of Scripture before spending time in quiet prayer, is an important foundation for a meaningful prayer life. But this is by no means the extent, or the definition, of a meaningful prayer life. If you only do this, and check it off your daily "To Do" list, and never think about the Lord again until the next day, then you have missed the point of prayer as a lifeline of communication with the Lord. Having established a daily quiet time, now we need to build on this, and go forward into the day with a spirit of prayer and dependence and humility and openness to the Spirit of Christ in our lives on a moment-by-moment basis. Paul said, "Pray without ceasing" (1 Thess. 5:17), and "in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" (Phil. 4:6). In the moment

1. God wants us to be joyful always

- Not just when we have electric power, but even when there is none. He said always!
- Can we be happy when what we planned, or things we got excited about and prepared for could not be done as planned because of the power outage? Yes we can because God said so and He is in control.
- Toronto being the biggest city in Canada, which in turn is one of the most developed countries in the

world, was no match to nature. Can you just imagine how powerful God is? He controls nature.

2. God wants us to be thankful always

• Not just to be joyful, but much deeper than that. Being responsive to Him is to be thankful to Him for everything regardless of the situation.

3. God wants us to be prayerful always

- This reminds us that when we pray, it is not only when we do not have power, nor only during church worship, bible study, or personal prayer times. Our spirit has to be in prayer mode the whole day.
- We do not have to fall on our knees, with clasped hands nor say it loudly. As we go through our day, life decisions (big or small), and how we deal with our relationships, can all be brought to God.
- Wherever we are and whatever we do, God wants us to include Him and make Him part of it.

When we have a prayerful life, having prayer as part of our lives in every aspect of it, God will be able to use us mightily for His glory. We will also enjoy a life of being joyful and thankful always.

So if there be another ice storm, snow storm or whatever storm that may come to our lives, remember that God is in control. We do not have to worry for we can pray. *Always*.

It's crystal clear to me now. For almost two decades living here in Canada, I do not quite remember having an extremely icy winter, all the more having to lose electric power because of it. But on December 22, 2013, just 3 more days before Christmas, we woke up to an extraordinarily silent home, free from the sounds of technology, except for my cellphone that signalled several text messages. If my memory serves me right, this was the very first time CABC cancelled church services due to the weather. It was that bad. So after several calls and text messages to pass the word around to those I think would brave the weather to go to church, my cellphone finally showed the bold seven-letter word "goodbye."

My communication with the outside world had been totally cut! It was time to panic ... not really. I could have charged the cellphone through the car, but to go out in the biting cold just to do that—wasn't that desperate (and my husband had 43% battery left on his phone so we were ok). So what does one do when deprived of the usual comforts we often take for granted? Maybe just relax, watch the snow while taking a sip of warm brewed coffee ... coffee? No electricity ... therefore no coffee! How did my sense of logic just escape me? My morning without coffee? You might as well shoot me! It was definitely time to panic! Just then my husband's phone rang. A couple of friends who happened to be at a coffee shop called to ask how we were—and if we would care for some coffee! In a short while, I was sipping the best coffee ever which was delivered right to our home. And as I thanked God for such thoughtful friends, I marveled at how He granted the desire of my heart even before I asked. I then realized it was not time to just sit back and watch the snow. It was time to gather the family to worship the Lord that Sunday morning without any modern day distraction.

The last time I played several songs on the guitar was far too long ago to recall. I knew I would later have to bear the pain of swollen fingertips, as I struggled to catch up with my 14 year old son's guitar skills. But that morning, my son and I joyfully played songs of praise and worship as the family sang together.

It was reminiscent of my growing up years when, amidst typhoons and consequent blackouts, our family would gather around singing out loud competing with the sound of the storm, while my mom played the piano under candlelight. This time, we had only pure silence to contend with.

Our family annually celebrates the Christmas Advent by lighting a one colored candle at a time, each representing who Jesus is and reminding us why He came to this world. We do this 4 consecutive Sunday evenings before we light the center (Christ) candle on Christmas Eve. We opted to take that morning to do our Advent time as part of our family worship service. As the yellow candle (of Hope) was being lit, I just felt immensely moved by such precious time of worshiping together as a family, that the last thing I hoped for was for the electrical power to be restored. We held hands as each of us took turns in prayer thanking God for all our blessings while lifting up in prayer those who are out in the cold. What I will always ponder in my heart though, are the prayers of all three sons. Their prayers reflected the compassion that they have for the destitute, but even more for those who do not have what they gratefully acknowledge as their greatest blessing: a loving family fueled by the love of God. My husband has expressed the same and I have as well. But amidst the holiday rush and series of simultaneous activities, I needed a time like this to realign myself with the Lord's purpose for Christmas: to remind us of His unconditional love for us through Jesus Christ. Thus, whatever unfinished tasks on my chore list, un-shopped gifts, and every tiny bit of "have to do's" I impose upon myself—those were all swept away. Treasurable moments like what we had, should remain unblemished by anxieties that are unnecessary anyway.

Power was restored at noon that same day. We were among the few who had only a few hours without it but we all felt just half relieved as if its return would take away our precious family time. It didn't. We continued the day playing Scrabble, something the family has not done for some time. Then we finally were able to view the movie series we've been procrastinating to watch due to other priorities.

However, I could only be thankful since it could have been worse. But at its wake, it aroused kind-heartedness among those who welcomed others to share the warmth of their homes. It fostered instant reunions among relatives and friends

that thought they did not have a common schedule. It made strangers speak to each other as they shared coping experiences. It nestled families to do things which otherwise they would not have found time to do together. Amidst all the ice, it made us look after the comfort of others with love.

At the heart of it all, it was a blessed opportunity for me to once again experience God's love. It was a privilege to witness that my sons have truly learned what it means to be content, to find joy in simplicity, and to be grateful in all circumstances.
