Putting Faith into Action

Most of us are familiar with the eleventh chapter of the book of Hebrews. It is known as the Bible's "hall of faith" for it records the lives of Old Testament saints characterized by their strong and steadfast faith in God. When one reads the passage, he cannot but realize that these women and men confessed their faith not

just by assenting to an abstract religious truth but by acting out what they have believed as true and certain. Theirs was not blind credulity, gullibility or even fanaticism. They believed in and accepted God's Word at its face value with an almost childlike quality. But what is more interesting is that their belief was transformed into corresponding behavior. Their creed became conduct; their orthodoxy expressed in orthopraxy. In other words, they didn't just believe in the right doctrine; they showed it in right living.

Faith therefore is not a passive virtue but an active one. Because of our faith, we are enabled to act on what we believe. Our head doesn't only accept and understand the truth from God as expressed in His Word, but our heart welcomes it and our will puts it into practice. James considers this as "pure and undefiled religion before God" (James 1:27). The Greek word translated "religion" appears only in this passage in the Bible and rarely, if ever, in classical Greek. The word refers to the careful outward observances connected to one's belief. The religious person is one who is concerned with all the external aspects of his religion and, yes, even of its ceremonial demands.

James 1:26, 27 gives 3 specific areas in which this faith or true religion is practiced.

First, faith is put into action by bridling one's tongue. The word "bridle" means "to hold in check", "to restrain". This metaphor comes from the practice of making a loop on the halter rope that is passed around a horse's lower jaw for the purpose of

controlling the animal. Of course, the idea is not to literally tie our tongue with some kind of a knot to hold it in check. One of the tests of true religion lays in our ability to curb or control our tongue. James avers that the tongue is a "small part of the body" (3:5), but can be "an unruly evil, full of deadly poison" (3:8), unless it is bridled. We've heard of the nursery rhyme, "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will not hurt me." Really?

Experiences however, have proved how hurtful words can be. Friendships have been broken and relationships have been severed simply because of carelessly spoken words. If our faith is true, the challenge for us is to "let our speech always be with grace, seasoned with salt" (Colossians 4:6). Paul commands, "Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen," (Ephesians 4:29 NIV). Solomon says, "...he who restrains his lips is wise. The tongue of the righteous is choice silver..." (Proverbs 10:19b, 20a). Then he adds, "He who guards his mouth preserves his life..." (Proverbs 13:3a). Faith that is real and religion that is true should lead us to "tame the tongue" through the enablement of the Holy Spirit. Remember this, "A word fitly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver," (Proverbs 25:11).

James further declares that pure religion is shown by

overt acts of love and kindness, that is, by "visiting orphans and widows in their trouble" (1:27). The word "visit" literally means "to look out" or "select" someone with the purpose of giving help. The thought carries the idea of exercising oneself as an overseer or shepherd in order to tend and care for someone- kindly, affectionately, genuinely. Jesus used the same language in Matthew 25:36, 43 in which the idea of "visiting the sick and afflicted" will be the criterion of His judgment of the nations, to separate "the sheep" from "the goats". John Phillips, in his commentary on this passage says, "In other words, the only kind of religion that James says would be accepted as genuine is that which expressed itself in pure conversation and practical conduct; naturally, one would not go empty-handed to visit orphans and widows." These folks were the most vulnerable ones in the populace and therefore the neediest of the support of those who had the means and capacity to provide help, comfort and care in the most tangible way possible. James argues, "If a brother or sister is naked and destitute of daily food and one of you says to them, 'Depart in peace, be warmed and filled, but you do not give them the things which are needed for the body, what does it profit?"(2:15, 16). Then he concludes, "Show me your faith without your works, and I will show you my faith by my works,"(2:18b). True faith is not dead. It is alive and vibrant as it extends itself to those in need through various expressions of kind acts and deeds. Yes, we are "saved by grace through faith... not of works" (Ephesians 2:8, 9), but "we are created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10). Who better to show such than to "orphans and widows in their distress"? This is what James insists.

Finally, religion that is pure is shown in keeping oneself "unspotted from the world". This refers to the believer's duty towards himself. His faith makes him lead a clean life. The Greek word

that is translated "unspotted" means "unstained", "unblemished", "spotless". This is the word that is used to describe Jesus as the "Lamb of God". James recognized that the world he was living in was dirty, polluted and vile just like ours today. If we were to show the reality of our faith, we have to make sure that we distance ourselves, not physically, but morally and spiritually from the world. It is to be understood that the word "world" is not referring to the planet in which we live but rather to the system of human morality and governance under the grip of the evil one (I John 5:19). It is the world of sinful men set over against God, following its own wisdom and living by the light of its own reason. Its two dominant characteristics are pride and covetousness. Accordingly, John commands us, "Do not love the world or the things in the world... For all that is in the world-the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life-is not of the Father..." (I John 2:15, 16). How can this be done? Paul says, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind..." (Romans 12:2). "We must resist the devil and he will flee from us." But first, we "submit ourselves to God" (James 4:7). Then we should walk in and be led by the Spirit and we will not fulfill the lust of the flesh (Galatians 5:16). Let's saturate our minds with the truth of God by consistent Bible reading, meditation and memorization (Psalm 119:11). We are to think of things that are true, noble, just, pure, lovely, of good report, virtuous and praiseworthy (Philippians 4:8). Doing these won't make us sinless, but they will surely give us the motivation to lead clean and holy lives as the Scripture demands. Praise God that, even if we become defiled by this dirty world, we have recourse to the cleansing blood of Christ and the purifying Word of God.

These, brethren, are practical ways of putting our faith into action. Let's go and do them.

Moses simply stretched out his hand in obedience to the Lord and the red sea parted. It was the simple "Yes Lord, here I am" of Abraham that led to the creation of the 12 tribes of Israel. It was John the Baptist's humble, every day labors that plowed the hearts of the Israelites in preparation for the Messiah. It was Paul's daily persistence that led to the conversion of the gentiles. Fenelon Falls, here we come! The Young At Heart group had their summer get-together-outing last July 13, Saturday, at Fenelon Falls. According to a travel brochure, Fenelon Falls is the name of a quaint village named after Father Abbe Fenelon, a missionary to the area's First Nation Peoples. It has a population of about 2,000. It is just about one and a half hours drive from CABC, close enough, so the ride back and forth was not tiring at all.

It was a wonderfully sunshiny day to begin with. Not too hot, not balmy, just a little breeze blowing to cool the air. Perfect day! Boarding time was 7:45 AM and mind you, as early as 7:30, most of the YAH were promptly at the CABC grounds, excited and waiting for the bus.

Once boarded at the bus, sister Sheila Herbert started the day with a prayer. Gaither Gospel Music was played throughout the trip. It was just so relaxing to hear such beautiful, timeless, inspirational songs from these very talented musicians. Once in a while YAH members sang along or clapped in rhythm with the melodies.

Just before lunch time, we arrived at the historic, picturesque village of Fenelon Falls at the city of Kawartha Lakes, in central Ontario, northeast of Toronto. We had a quick tour of the shops around the boarding dock where we were to take the boat cruise. Cheap stores? Nah! But we really had a great time window shopping, and having fun just looking at the price tags! One of us was "horrified" to see an ordinary-looking blouse with a price tag of \$163! We were in middle of a beautiful tourist downtown core, what were we expecting!

Before the boat cruise, we had our lunch at the very rustic, Lakeshore Restaurant. Lunch was sumptuous with a choice of roast turkey or beef, toast, vegetables and mashed potato on the side. Dessert was a big square of chocolate fudge pecan cake with whipped cream. Everybody had their fill.

The boat cruise, aboard Kawartha Spirit started at Fenelon Falls' Lock 34, one of the 45 locks of a man-made waterway system which was developed to interconnect more than 250 lakes and rivers in central Ontario (source-Explore Kawartha Lakes brochure). As explained by the boat captain, each lock has 2 tunnels, one water discharging tunnel and another for intake. The lock controls the water flow at a scheduled time. Once Lock 34 opened, our boat entered into a narrow canal where the water level where we came from (Cameron Lake) is

much higher than where we were headed (Sturgeon Lake). We waited for about 8 minutes in the canal for the water to be discharged up to the right level to cross to the other side. It was about a 12-foot drop and no pump or machine sucks the water up, just sheer gravity pulls the water down to the discharging tunnel. It works very much like "draining the bathtub", says our captain.

Right next to Lock 34 is the low waterfall, aptly called, Fenelon Falls. The falls has a dam and a bridge on top of it. Some of us were expecting to see a tall waterfall, just like the majestic Niagara Falls. Some even brought a change of clothes just in case we got soaked up.

The view along the lake was breath-taking, scenic, unspoiled, real beauty of the past. It was also breezy that day which made the cruise even more relaxing. There were cottages on both sides of the lake, most of them were built 100 years ago (as per our Captain)! There were beach cottages of different sizes and architectural designs, from modest to palatial cottages. Imagine one cottage of about 20,000 square feet of floor area!

There were plenty to see on both sides of the lake, the foliage along the banks, the beautiful flowers and plants on the cottages, an antique fire hydrant decorating a cottage owned by a retired Toronto fireman and the people who were out in the sun that day, lounging in their beach chairs, swimming, diving, kayaking, boating, fishing and waving at us, especially when our captain sounded the boat's horns. They were friendly people.

It was a truly a no-fuss, 2-hour boat cruise to enjoy the beautiful sceneries and marvel at how great our God who has created all these wonderful things for us.

After the cruise, we gathered at a nearby park where we had coffee and huge muffins. Some of us tried the homemade ice cream at one of the eateries. Different, unique local flavours, like the Muskoka Ice flavour which has some chocolate and coffee tidbits in it. Yummy, yummy.

Before heading home, Pastor Elbern gave a short encouraging message on Psalm 90, the blessings of beauty around us and the blessings at every aspect of our abundant lives because of Jesus. And with all God-given beauty around and within us, we should be satisfied and should have no reason at all to end our days with a sigh. Thank you for the message, Pastor.

The trip back was even further relaxing as most of us napped. It was truly a wonderful field day, we were simply out there to enjoy the scenic view and the wonderful fellowship with one another. Not much strenuous activities, no long walks, perfect weather, great outdoors. God be praised for another perfect day!


